He has presided over five different Masonic bodies, and has membership to over twenty-five Masonic organizations, research groups and societies such as SRICF, AASR, York Rite, Red Cross of Constantine, AMD, Athelstan, Acon, National Sojourners and Operatives. He is the chairman of the annual Allied Masonic Degree week in Virginia, and is the current Grand Historian of the Grand Lodge of New Jersey. He works for The Port Authority of New York & New Jersey - for twenty-six years as a member of the Emergency Service Unit stationed at the George Washington Bridge. He was working and responded to both terrorist attacks on American soil in 1993 & 2001.

The Lodge will tyle at 7.00 pm to deal with the business - and adjourn to the Clubrooms to hear Bro Gomez.

From the Provincial Almoner

I'm afraid, once again, I must start my report on a sad note by recording the passing to the Grand Lodge Above of several of our beloved Brethren.

In September, we lost Past Master Bob Maclean, Lodge Seaforth, Fortrose. Bob passed away suddenly in Raigmore Hospital, Inverness, a few days after a long-awaited hip replacement operation. Bob had been in some considerable pain for several years and was so looking forward to the operation and being without pain. As well as being a Past Master of Lodge Seaforth, Bob was also a Past Z of St Clement Royal Arch Chapter and a member of many other Masonic orders. He was highly respected throughout freemasonry and this was evidenced by the huge number of brethren, from far and wide, in attendance at his funeral.

In October Past Master Sandy Rose, Lodge Rosehaugh, Avoch passed away at his home, surrounded by his family, after a long illness. Until ill health prevented him Sandy was a regular attender at his Lodge and very supportive of all that was happening within it. The esteem in which he was held was also very evident by the huge attendance of brethren at his funeral.

Last week we learned of the passing of Past Master Bill Thomson, Robertson's Lodge, Cromarty. Bill had been Master of his Lodge in 1970 but had not been in the Lodge for several years.

A few days ago, we learned of the passing of Past Master Raymond Morrison, Lodge Ness, Invergordon. Raymond passed away in the Highland Hospice after a long illness. As well as being a Past Master of his Lodge Raymond was a Past Z of Cromarty Firth Royal Arch Chapter. At the time of writing Raymond's funeral has not yet taken place.

All these brethren will be greatly missed and our sympathies go out to their families. Cards have been sent, where possible, to the families conveying the condolences of the Provincial Grand Master and brethren of the Province.

Bro Dougie MacDougall, Lodge Fingal, Dingwall has now been moved to Redwoods Nursing Home in Alness. I haven't yet visited him there but I have spoken to him on the telephone and he seemed to be in good form. My thanks to Past Master Angus Ross, Lodge Ness for letting me know that Dougie had moved there.

Past Master Cochrane Donald, Lodge Seaforth, Fortrose has still not fully recovered and doesn't go out much. He is shortly to start making use of the mobility scooter which had previously been used by the late Past Master Sinclair Bruce. It's to be hoped that he will make full use of it.

Past Master Victor Shepherd is still resident in Strathallan Care Home, Strathpeffer. He is very often confused and his mobility is not very good and he falls quite a lot. He uses a zimmer frame for walking. However, he is still being taken out of the home by friends and family for runs locally.

Past Master Andrew MacIvor, Robertson's Lodge, recently sustained a broken shoulder after having fallen from a work bench while removing curtain rods during his flitting to a new house. He is recovering well and hopes to have his sling removed in ten days to a fortnight's time Rumour has it that in fact, having heard of the recent retirement of the Olympic athlete, Jessica Ennis, he was limbering up in the hope getting a place in the team for the 2020 Games!

Past Master Ronnie Sutherland, Lodge Fingal was recently in Raigmore Hospital with heart problems but I'm glad to say that he is now out of hospital and recovering well. He is able to attend masonic meetings.

I have visited brethren both at home and in hospital where possible and sent or delivered cards where appropriate conveying the best wishes of the Provincial Grand Master and brethren of the Province.

Lodge Allan Wilson No 851

The Lodge has recently acquired an historical ritual from the Brethren of Gwelo Lodge No 876 in Harare. The document is in poor condition but is believed to be a ritual recovered from the body of one of the soldiers killed alongside Major Allan Wilson in the massacre at Shangani.

It is proposed that the Lodge seeks professional advice on how best to restore / preserve the document and thereafter carry out further research to find out who the soldier was.

The Ritual is from the English Constitution and dates to 1769 although the certificate in which the ritual was wrapped appears to originate from Lodge Dalkeith. However, the writing is so faded that it will be difficult to get further information without technical support.

I have no doubt that there will be some interesting communication between the Lodge and Grand Almoner, a Past Master of Lodge Dalkeith Kilwinning No 10.

This is an exciting find for the Brethren of Lodge Allan Wilson and we are most grateful to the Brethren of Gwelo Lodge for presenting the documentation to us.

PROPOSED VISIT TO KENYA and MALAWI

The Installation of the District Grand Master of East Africa, Brother Mike Craig, will take place in the Masonic Temple, Nairobi on Saturday 24th June 2017. I will be travelling to Nairobi for the Installation and thereafter travelling on to Malawi to pay a return visit to the Mountain View School for Deaf Children and carry out the re-installation of the Grand Superintendent, Brother Gordon Sheppard, re-dedicate Lodge David Livingston No 1162 to celebrate their 100th anniversary and thereafter Install their Master and Office-bearers.

I am currently looking at costs and obviously the earlier the booking is made the cheaper it will be. Flights from Scotland to Nairobi and back are looking to come in around $\pounds700$ (now) but it would appear that internal flights in Africa are going to be as expensive – we could be looking at travel costs

of between $\pounds 1000$ and $\pounds 1500$ but I hope that the firm I normally use for flights will be able to reduce those costs. Hotel costs are similar to what we would pay here.

I will be seeking definitive prices as soon as I can. If any of the Brethren (and wives) would like to travel to Kenya and Malawi, please let me know as we can secure discount on group travel.

Those who have travelled out to Africa in the past have enjoyed the experience – the African welcome and hospitality is second to none.

During the trip, I'm happy to organise either a short safari in Kenya or a trip to Lake Malawi in Malawi.

Life at the school is not getting any easier and while our PGM is encouraging us to help cover the cost of term fees for those who cannot afford them other basics are also needed. I attach a blog from one of the young volunteers at the school which sums up the situation nicely -

Hello! My name is Charlotte and for 7 months, I volunteered in a Malawian primary school for deaf children. I taught English and (attempted to teach) maths to a beautiful class in standard 6. This was one of the best experiences of my life and I grew very close to the teachers and students, now calling many of them my family. The wonderful teachers at Mountain View care for the students immensely and invest copious time and energy into their futures.

However, a lack of basic materials makes this challenging on a daily basis, especially with no equipment for the hearing impaired. The quality of their education and wellbeing would be greatly improved by just a few items:

- A printer for the school: having no printer poses a significant obstacle during the examination period when papers must be written on the blackboards. For students with learning disabilities, this is an instant disadvantage.

- Sporting gear such as soccer balls and trainers: these would definitely be used! Shoes would also prevent injury from playing barefoot.

- Basic mathematical instruments like compasses and protractors.

I'm extremely excited to be returning for 6 weeks and want to do my best to help Mountain View. The students are very lucky to be in such a nurturing environment, but I know it's not always easy for the school to provide what they do; **the passion is there, but the means are not**.

AS A MATTER OF INTEREST by Bro Donnie Mathieson, Lodge Averon 866

In my last article, I had shared and interesting document I have stumbled on whist on my holiday visiting the island of Santorini. Well it turns out we had a member of our very own Lodge, Bro Gary Miller who had friends in Malta and had the letter translated for me.

It transpires that it is not a Templar doc as the Templars ceased to exist in 1314. This letter is dated 1744. Fra Emanuel Pinto appears to be a Knight Hospitaller. The Maltese would have referred to him as is-Sultan which means king. None the less most interesting.

Translation below.

Brother Emmanuel Pinto

By the Grace of God, Humble Master of the Holy house of the Hospital of St John, military and Jerusalemitan order, poor guardian of the Holy Sepulchre of our Lord Jesus Christ. (*might not be exact but the sense is there*)

To all and to whomsoever's hands bear this our letters patent; greetings: Let it me noted and shown that it is our will that whoever arms ships and flies our flag or that of our Religion, for the purpose of waging war on the enemies of our Holy Faith, not only do they not endanger the inhabitants of the Islands who profess our Christian Religion but they also offer them all help and assistance; we cannot lead you to believe that all the said militants (armatori) have obeyed our orders and did not stray from the honourable and Catholic debt. If a captain has the audacity to molest and harm the inhabitants of the Island of Miconi (modern day Mykonos), whether Greek or Latin, there remains no other path for us but to order him to immediately return our letters-patent by virtue of the Holy Obedience to the Venerable General of the Galleys of this our Religion, and to the Venerable lieutenant of the maritime army of the same, and the commander of our ship squadron, and to all, to any captain of which, to captains of other vessels, and particular navies, of these our Islands and dominions, under the serious arbitrary punishments, to us, who neither directly nor indirectly under whatever pretext worry, disturb or harm the inhabitants of the Island of Miconi, in their person, abodes, or their merchandise. We declare that we will make him account for every act of hostility and violence he committed to the said inhabitants of this Island of Miconi, wherein we wish that the value of our Catholic Faith remains respected and protected by our soldiers; and therefore: ships and merchandise appertaining to Greeks and Latin Catholics, inhabitants of the Island of Miconi, if not in the hands of the enemies of the Christian name, and furnished with these letters patent as passport, we wish, that the copy of this undersigned and authentically sealed by the Reverend Prior Superior of the Residence of the Company of Jesus of Santorini, which will be yearly renewed, is given due and undoubted credit. In testimony of which is our princely seal in black wax, issued from our Convent in Malta on the 13 March 1744 executed in the appropriate manner of our Chancellery according to the Ordinary Corso 1745.
