As this February edition goes to press, Grand Committee will be preparing to meet by Zoom on Thursday 4<sup>th</sup> February. At that meeting I am confident that Brother Raymond Alexander MacKeddie, Past Master of Lodge Seaforth 854 will be confirmed as the new Provincial Grand Master. His Commission will take effect from Thursday 10<sup>th</sup> June 2021.

The outcomes from all three meetings will be fed into the Strategy Group who will collate the findings and submit a report to the Administration Committee.

Those outcomes will help to determine both the short-term strategy to get us out of the Covid pandemic and the long-term strategy to take Scottish Freemasonry forward for the foreseeable future.

# From the Provincial Almoner

Thankfully, in these troubled times, my report will be somewhat shorter than it has been of late, but sadly, once again, I have to start on a sad note and record the passing of two well-known and well-loved brethren.

On 9<sup>th</sup> December Bro. George MacIvor, Robertson's Lodge, Cromarty, passed to the Grand Lodge Above in Raigmore Hospital, Inverness. He had been a patient there for a few days prior to his passing. He had not enjoyed the best of health for some time and had been resident in Wyvis House Care Home, Dingwall, along with his wife Hilda. George had been a freemason for almost 65 years. He served his lodge with distinction and had served as both Substitute Master and Depute Master, a position he held at the time of his passing. George was also involved with Provincial Grand Lodge and held the office of Provincial Grand Tyler for a period of 15 years, and, likewise, with Provincial Grand Royal Arch Chapter where he held the office Provincial Grand Janitor for 11 years. In recognition of his services the rank of Honorary Grand Tyler was conferred on him in 1996. Due to the current restrictions re the Covid 19 pandemic George's funeral was held in private at Inverness Crematorium, however, a large number of Masonic brethren gathered outside Lodge Fingal to pay their last respects as his cortege passed.

On 22<sup>nd</sup> January Bro. Terry Rhodes, Lodge Averon, Alness passed to the Grand Lodge Above. Terry had been ill for some time. Terry had been initiated into freemasonry in England prior to moving to Scotland. At the time of his passing, he was the Chaplain of Lodge Averon. He was a regular attender at the Lodge. Terry's funeral will be held in private at Inverness Crematorium on Thursday 4<sup>th</sup> February. Brethren will assemble outside Lodge Averon on the day of the funeral to show their respects to Terry as his cortege passes.

Both brethren will be greatly missed in their respective lodges and cards have been sent to both families conveying the condolences of the Provincial Grand Master and brethren of the Province.

Past Master Angus Ross, Lodge Ness, Invergordon is doing well and is able to get out, weather permitting, on his mobility scooter and in fact was out yesterday. I spoke to him this morning and he was in great form.

Past Master Fraser MacKay, Lodge St Duthus, Tain is still in care at Innis Mhor Care Home in Tain. His condition has not improved.

Past Master Ian MacLaren, Lodge Rosehaugh, Avoch attends Raigmore Hospital three days a week for dialysis treatment. He is coping well and every time I speak to him, he is in his usual good form.

Lodge St Duthus No 82 have had a more active month during December than has been the norm. As we all know the current pandemic and lockdown procedures have meant that individuals and families have had to cope with stresses that have impacted on the health and well-being of many amongst us.

In order to try to alleviate this impact, Lodge St Duthus this year decided to give a gift at Christmas to all of its members and their partners. We also included widows of members that have passed away. This was to remind all, that although we were all isolating the members of the Lodge were thinking of them. The Lodge decided to purchase well-being gifts from a local business '*Made in Tain*' which is a Social Enterprise company that helps teenagers and young adults who have support needs and assists these young people into employment.

*Made in Tain* have struggled greatly as a result of COVID19 and have had to stop young people from coming into their premises due to the social distancing rules. We decided to support *Made in Tain* and in turn the young people by purchasing over 50 gift packs which included soap, smellies, shortbread and chocolates all made and packaged by the young people. These gifts and a card were then all distributed by the brethren the weekend before Christmas.

Whilst Brethren met in the Lodge to collect the gifts the opportunity was taken to present a gift of a lamp from Tain Pottery to our retiring Treasurer PM Dan Patience. We can only hope that the vaccination programme will be successful in allowing us all to get back to some kind of normality before then.

Thank goodness for the technology that allows us to meet virtually and speak with each other, indeed it has giving our brethren from all over the globe that opportunity. Because of these zoom meetings we are being kept pretty much up to date with all that is happening not just in the province but outwith.

Some detail from the zoom meetings:

November 6 - RWM Macinnes welcomed Bro Stuart Jack, Lodge St Bryde 579. Bro Jack delivered a lecture in relation to members of Lodge St Bryde who had served in the World Wars and other conflicts and in relation to Commonwealth War Graves most of which he is in the process of visiting.

December - Bro Mike Phillips, who was joining from Virginia, gave a lecture in relation to the Grand Lodge of Virginia and a history of Freemasonry in Virginia.

January 1 - PGM Donald Mackenzie, British Colombia and Yukon introduced several Brethren from the Province who were attending the meeting and extended fraternal greetings and a happy new year. Bro Charles Buchanan gave a short history of freemasonry in British Columbia.

Also, on 1<sup>st</sup> January a wreath was laid by the Lodge at the Iolaire memorial in remembrance of the brethren who lost their lives and in remembrance of close relations of current lodge members.

The photo on the next page shows our Master, Brother Henry MacInnes and Past Master Derek Mackay at the Iolaire memorial. The Iolaire disaster is one of the most tragic events in the history of the Western Isles. Two months after the end of the First World War, 205 men died, 174 Lewis men and 7 Harris men, sailors who had survived the war - and were only yards from the shore, where families were watching to welcome them home.

The photo on page 12 depicts the Lodge's annual benevolence distribution amounted to  $\pm 3000$ , some of which was given to needy members in the form of a hamper.

# BLAST FROM THE PAST - FROM - FEBRUARY 2005

"The "Bell" which has been mounted proudly on the wall to the left of the Junior Warden's chair, was erected as a lasting memorial to the late Bro George Dickson. It was placed in this position as the chair to the left of the JW was George's favourite seat in the Lodge. Bro George was a first engineer on tankers and cargo boats during the Second World War. His voyages were generally from the UK to America and Canada. On two of these trips, George's ship was torpedoed. On the first occasion, they were not far from the English coast and managed to limp back to Liverpool. On the second occasion however, when near to Nova Scotia, a torpedo sank their ship. George grabbed his beloved melodeon and clambered down a ladder into a lifeboat but, unfortunately, in the process lost his grip on the melodeon and it disappeared in the murky depths never to be seen again. After the war, George continued his career in the Merchant Navy. At one point, he secured the position of first engineer on board a ship that was crewed primarily by Germans and George never let them forget that it was due to their activities that he lost his beloved melodeon.

The Bell, as far as I know, must have come from one of the early ships that George sailed on as he had it in his possession for many years. George's daughter presented the Bell to the Lodge so that it could hang in his memory. I very often visited George in his house where the Bell hung from the ceiling in his living room. Many a time when we were having a dram, he would ring the Bell and say – Robert, that's a twelve bells dram."

#### A WINTER OF DISCONTENT

Christmas came and went as did the New Year without any issue up at the 100+ years old Lodge in Kyle of Lochalsh. At least 4 of the Brethren regularly check and clean, making sure that the repairs to the roof are holding fast and the pipes are not frozen. The rest of the Brethren are keeping well with PM Rob (and staff) running the Post Office and shop flawlessly throughout the "pandemic", and other Brethren toiling away from home or out on the road supplying essential services. Kyle is a small community, and we keep our ears open for any information that would suggest locals are suffering hardship, but as yet everyone seems to be "coping" with the isolation as well as the lack of money and daily purpose.

My own feeling is that as the virus loosens its grip on Scotland, and the rest of the world, financial resources from the government will lessen and this is where we as Freemasons need to be especially vigilant for those in dire straits.

That said, Lodge Kyle has resources in the bank should we be required to reach out and help quickly. I should also mention that the young folk in the area are still volunteering, even after nearly a year, to bring goods to those unable to get to the shops, and that there is a community food bank at the Church in Kyle which is utilised. (As well as others dotted around rural communities).

January also saw a telephone call from a representative of a small government body, wishing to hire the Lodge Hall for the day, on a regular basis. Everything seemed mutually agreeable until the fellow "just wanted to confirm" that our Wi-Fi was of reasonable quality. I had to tell him we had no Broadband into the Masonic Hall and with that... the conversation ended. As secretary I can't think of reasons why as Freemasons who meet less than a dozen times a year, we actually NEED Broadband in the Hall, especially as we don't currently have a phone there. However, there are good broadband deals from 20 pounds per month; but this is a heavy annual expense for a small rural Lodge; so why even mention it? The reality is we DON'T need broadband at present however opportunities begin to open up if we do have broadband in the Hall. Hall hire becomes more appealing, especially during the day for small groups, creating a break-even point at only one reasonable group hire per month. Seminars using laptops and tablet computers become a possibility and of course situations we have not considered that will inevitably appear once people know that the facilities are. There is also the hidden marketing potential of having a community regularly using the Masonic Hall and being more open about access. Something to think about, especially as Lodge is 2 metres from BT's Exchange Broadband Connections.

We are all aware of the Masonic significance of the acacia plant however, the late PM Bob MacLean, Lodge Seaforth, came up with some other interesting information about the acacia plant back in 2005:

There are about 800 varieties including the wattle, mimosa, long folia and pravissima, commonly known as Ovens wattle. In India, it is placed in the turban to ward off evil. The wood is burnt in incense along with sandalwood to enhance psychic powers. In Mediterranean countries it represents life, immortality, platonic love and retirement and, having both red and white flowers, it denotes death and life and death and rebirth. The crown of thorns was said to have been made of acacia. To the Egyptians it symbolises the sun, rebirth, immortality and innocence. To the Hebrews it was the Shittah tree, the sacred wood of the tabernacle and symbolised immortality, a moral life, innocence but also funerals and mourning.
