Welcome to the 86th edition of the Patter.

I had the privilege of attending the 250th anniversary of the Lodge of Glamis No 99 recently. The Lodge room, situated in the centre of the village of Glamis, is a beautiful stone built building, well maintained and well-presented inside. One of the features of the anniversary was the opening of their museum within the building and among the artefacts displayed is the attendance book signed by Prince Albert (the future King George VI) when he affiliated to the Lodge in June 1936. What really appealed to me was the fact that the future King was obligated by the then Master of the Lodge, the Glamis postman, James Beattie. It doesn't matter what your station is in life, within the Lodge we are all on the level.

Having viewed the new museum, it highlighted for me the issues that we have been debating at the Scottish Masonic Materials Group – the preservation of Lodge Records.

In general terms, it is essential that Lodge records are properly preserved – they are important historical documents both masonically and from a local community perspective. Such documents can be safely deposited either in Grand Lodge or in local archive centres. Expert assistance can be sought from the SMMG if you require it. The Secretary of SMMG, Bro Charles Winston, can be contacted at mail@winston.plus.com or give me a ring locally.

In a few weeks I will have the pleasure of attending the 2nd International Conference of Scottish Freemasons in Africa and Asia. This year it will be held in Penang in Malaysia. If it is half as good as the first one which was held in East Africa – it will be good. At the moment there are over 200 Brethren attending which is excellent news.

- 2 Always keep your words soft and sweet, just in case you have to eat them.
- 3 Always read stuff that will make you look good if you die in the middle of it.
- 4 Drive carefully. It's not only cars that can be recalled by their Maker.
- 5 If you can't be kind, at least have the decency to be vague.
- 6 If you lend someone £20 and never see that person again, it was probably worth it.
- 7 It may be that your sole purpose in life is simply to serve as a warning to others.
- 8 Never buy a car you can't push.
- 9 When everything's coming your way, you're in the wrong lane.
- 10 Nobody cares if you can't dance well. Just get up and dance.

I'm sure you will join me in expressing our sincere condolences to their respective families.

As I write this, Past Master Hugh Patience, Lodge St Duthus is undergoing tests at Edinburgh Royal Infirmary. I understand that he will shortly be returning home and will thereafter have to undergo treatment at Raigmore Hospital, Inverness.

Past Master Cochrane Donald, Lodge Seaforth is now out of hospital and according to himself is making slow progress and is able to walk further. He has regular visits from community nurses to change dressings etc.

Past Master Bob MacLean, Lodge Seaforth is still waiting word as to a date for his proposed hip replacement. However, he is in good spirits and is able to attend to his masonic duties.

Past Master Victor Shepherd is still in very much the same condition as he has been for some time. Some good days and some not so good. He is still managing to get by without a wheelchair and on a recent visit to him he was able to come to the door with me with only the use of a walking stick and not the normal zimmer frame. He still attends Strathallan Care Home, Strathpeffer as a day patient on two days a week.

Provincial Director of Ceremonies, Past Master Rory MacKenzie, Lodge Fingal continues to make good progress. He has completed his chemotherapy treatment and is again attending masonic meetings. His progress has been such that he was able to carry out the recent Installation Ceremony at Lodge Fingal.

Past Master Ian MacLaren, Lodge Rosehaugh is still awaiting a date for his proposed surgery but after his appointment with a plastic surgeon in November he was told that his surgery would take place within the following three months. He hopes that it will take place some-time in March.

Past Master Sandy Rose, Lodge Rosehaugh, also continues to make progress slowly. He hasn't been able to attend any meetings yet but hopes to do so in the not too distant future.

Past Master Fraser MacKay, Lodge St Duthus, is not really making much progress.

Past Master Raymond Morrison, Lodge Ness continues to progress and is regularly attending meetings. He says that both he, and his doctors, are amazed at his progress.

I have visited brethren in hospital and at home where possible and have sent or delivered cards to them conveying the best wishes of the Provincial Grand Master and brethren of the Province.

Visit to South Africa

On the evening of Wednesday December 9th, 2015, I visited Lodge De Goede Hoop No 1 in Cape Town, South Africa.

Being the “Christmas Meeting”, it was attended by The Grand Master of South Africa, the Provincial Grand Master, Southern Division, and over seventy Brethren from all over South Africa.

After the Lodge was opened I was, together with the other visitors, invited to enter the Lodge, formally announced and cordially and fraternally greeted by the Worshipful Master.

The principal business of the evening was an Initiation – a ceremony totally different from any other I have witnessed.

It was indeed an experience – and a privilege – to have been a part of it, not only from the solemnity and sincerity of the occasion but also from the splendour of the surroundings.

The magnificent temple, pictured below, was consecrated on 7 July 1803 by Advocate JH de Mist, Commissioner of the Cape, who was also Deputy Grand Master National of the Netherlands. During the 1840s a banqueting hall was added next to the Lodge and this housed the Cape Parliament from 1854 to 1884 when the present House of Assembly was completed. In February 1892 the Lodge, together with its banqueting hall, was gutted by fire and only a small section was not destroyed. The building was rebuilt, and was consecrated in April 1893

Needless to say, at the dinner following the meeting, as a visitor from the UK I was suddenly asked to say a few words which, with the help of a few glasses of South African pinotage, came quite readily – and were indeed warmly received!!

Altogether a Masonic evening I shall never forget.

Blast from the Past – this article first appeared in February 2000 – 16 years ago.

I am obliged to the RWM, Bro David Whitehouse for the following article:

QUOTE UNQUOTE

Or it might be alright on the night

“It must be acknowledged that for most of us, working ritual ‘on the floor’ carries some degree of stress and this is true not only for those who are new at it. The mind works overtime, not just to remember the words but the physical moves involved. At times like these it is all too easy to misquote or mispronounce the odd word or phrase and often not realise what one has said until afterwards.

In the hope that other Lodges in the Province might record for ‘the Patter’ some of their classic boo boos, I offer some of those heard in or around 108.

One cannot but feel sorry for the poor candidate who in his EA test questions purported that *‘it necessarily follows that the sun must always be at the Mediterranean’*.

Perhaps less sympathy could be extended to the Master who, before a ballot, cited the criteria for those who were *‘illegible to vote’*. Or the Past Master who, in delivering the traditional history in the 3rd under some pressure, substituted for ‘beads of perspiration’ - *‘blobs of sweat’*.

Maybe it was a genuine understanding (or maybe not) on the part of the candidate who, having taken his EA obligation, was naturally asked what was, in his present situation, the predominant wish of his heart. On being prompted by the JD to answer light, he replied - *‘a pint of heavy’*.

At a second degree outside the Province (but not too far) the candidate was, among other matters, obligated to *‘maintain the principles inoculated in the former degree.’*

It would be unfair to put too much blame on the Past Master called in at very short notice to preside over a degree when he completed a candidate’s obligation *‘being that of an Entered Apprentice technician’*, and gave an encore by closing the Lodge with the wish that *‘every moral and social cement, the cement that cements us’*. He was later admonished by Brother Architect for using too much cement in his Masonry.

Finally, a case of the mumbling Deacon who prompted the candidate on the location of a certain pillar. The poor candidate, having misheard, reported to the Junior warden - *‘at the poachers entrance to King Solomon’s Temple’*.

The Sinclair Bruce Diary

It is with the greatest regret that I inform all readers of the Passing to the Grand Lodge Above of Past Master, Brother Sinclair George Bruce on Sunday 13th December 2015

Brother Sinclair George Bruce was initiated into Lodge Seaforth No 854 in April 1977 and served as Master of the Lodge from December 1988 until December 1990. He was a Reponing Member and Lodge Treasurer of Lodge Allan Wilson No 851 – at the time of his Passing, he was Master of Lodge Allan Wilson.

I remember well when Sinclair was initiated into Lodge Seaforth – I was Junior Deacon and the late Brother Andrew Shaw was in the Chair. We were all delighted when we learned that Sinclair was becoming a member as everyone knew him and had great respect for him as the local Draper in the village of Munloch. But of course Sinclair served a far wider public than the Black Isle; with his big imposing van, Sinclair regularly toured the west coast taking his smiling personal service to those who had great difficulty in getting to Dingwall or Inverness a service that was greatly appreciated. It always fascinated me that whenever we were visiting the Lodges in places like Aultbea or Sleat, everyone knew Sinclair – he was a very popular individual.

A few weeks after the funeral I was sitting having a blether with Sinclair's wife Margaret and she very aptly described Sinclair as a quiet man. He was indeed a quiet man but he had a very powerful voice. Both as a ritualist and a singer, you knew when Sinclair was about. He took great pride in his ritual work and it was always a joy to listen to him – everything he did was done with precision but equally important, with feeling. If there was no organist available, Sinclair would take the lead. He had a fine voice and he loved to sing.

In the Provincial Grand Lodge of Ross and Cromarty, Sinclair was a very capable and caring Provincial Grand Almoner. It was in that role that Sinclair first started to pen an article for this newsletter. When his own health determined that he could no longer carry out that Office, I suggested to him that he should continue to write for the newsletter and so began the "Sinclair Bruce Diary" a feature that everyone loved to read. It reflected his love of sport, his love of all things Masonic and from time to time his no nonsense view of some of our politicians.

Knockbain Church in Munloch was packed on the day of the funeral. It was a short, simple service, just as Sinclair would have wanted. The tremendous singing of the two hymns – "How Great Thou Art" and "Abide with Me" was in itself a tribute to a man who loved singing the Psalms and Hymns.

For me, one of the most poignant parts of the service was the choice of the reading. The words of Paul to the Colossians – "*clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience and over all these virtues put on love which binds them all together in perfect unity*" – seemed to me to sum up the life and character of Sinclair George Bruce perfectly while the words of the final verse – "*And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him*" – was surely a very profound message from Sinclair to each and every one of us.

Sinclair will be greatly missed by all of us but more so by his wife Margaret, sons Ronald and Ian and the extended family. To them we extend our deepest condolences.

BITS AND PIECES

Just as a matter of interest - German Renaissance master Albrecht Durer **Melencolia I** (1514) and Knight **Death and the devil** (1513). I have both these prints hanging on my office wall right in front of my desk for reasons I hope will become clear as you read this article. There have been many interpretations of these engravings which have become known as, **the old master prints**. There is a 3rd print called **Saint Jerome in his Study** which is equally interesting in masonic terms. In fact, the allegorical references to masonry for me are stark. However, there is no suggestion that Albrecht Durer was a freemason that I can find. I will leave it up to you to decide or maybe some of our more enlightened brethren might be able to, well, enlighten us.

Look closely Brethren. The angel is despondent she has lost her confidence on her journey back to God and she is surrounded by allegory of that path to him. Take a look at the dog, which at this time was a reference to a person's soul, it is lethargic and bald, not very healthy looking. The large rhomohedron or what is known as Druers solid (A key stone maybe?) if you look closely has a faint skull imprinted on it, the magic square as reference to the sciences, Jacobs ladder, the hour glass and King Solomon's temple. Feature high amongst masonic allegory from across a wide range of degrees and orders within the craft. Coincidence?

What do you think? A very interesting image altogether. In fact, I am sure some our more experienced brethren will recognise a lot more.

Knight, Death and the Devil.

Again you need to look closely. This is a more complex image which is infused with complex symbolism and allegory which no one, it seems, can agree the meaning. However, for me the reference to freemasonry is clear. As we journey east toward Gods house, you can just see in the distance, a skull, and hourglass. Note the Knights dog (Sole) Look how shiny his coat is and how resolute they both are on continuing their journey. Also if you look real close (you may have to expand the image) you will see a lizard scuttling in the opposite direction. A clear reference it is not only Death and the Devil that might try and prevent you journeying east, there will always be someone trying to stand in your way. Death is in front of the knight holding the hourglass as a reminder that Death meets us all when that time is right and devil behind you for that entire journey.

In all, the reference to a host of degrees and orders for me is stark. What about you?

On top of the smooth ashlar are the words: The mind of man in his declining years after a regular life well spent in the acts of piety and virtue.


The light and dark grey paving reflects the joys and sorrows of our chequered existence. Engraved on the walkway are the words: Brotherly Love – Relief – Truth.
