The Installation was carried out in a most diligent and dignified manner by his predecessor, Brother Brigadier Sir Gregor MacGregor of MacGregor who was complimented on his endeavour especially as he had suffered a recurrence of his recent illness earlier in the week.

There was a sad note during the Installation when it was intimated that Brother Captain Robert Wolrige Gordon of Esslemont was seriously ill and that the prognosis was not good at all. I'm sure our thoughts and best wishes go out to Brother Wolrige Gordon and his family at this unhappy time.

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#### **Grand Master Masons Diary**

Since the May edition of the Patter, I have been kept reasonably busy and have had the honour and pleasure of meeting many Brethren at home and abroad.

One of the most poignant moments I have had was on the day the last "Patter" was published. I was joined by Grand Secretary, the PGM and Depute PGM of Glasgow at the Synagogue in Giffnock for the Yom HaShoah event. This was a very moving remembrance of the 600,000 Jews who were exterminated by the Nazi's. Our presence as Freemasons was acknowledge by the Chairwoman who alluded to the fact that we too had suffered greatly at the hands of the Nazi regime. I was very impressed by the prominent role that young people played in the event and have since written to the Chairwoman thanking her and her committee for their kind invitation to participate in the evening.

The following Saturday was a trip down the A9 to Stoneyburn in West Lothian where I had the pleasure of presiding over the Centenary Celebrations of Lodge St John 1186. We had an excellent day during which the Brethren pulled out all the stops to ensure that it would be a Centenary to remember.

On the Sunday, it was back up the A9 for the Provincial Divine Service held this year in Lodge Rosehaugh. On the Monday night I had the pleasure of accompanying the PGM on his annual visit to Lodge Kyle where we witnessed an excellent degree and enjoyed the Kyle hospitality.



The following weekend, Brother Rev Dr Joseph J Morrow, CBE and I were the two guest speakers at a dinner hosted by the Provincial Grand Lodge of Fife and Kinross on Friday 10<sup>th</sup> May. We were both regally looked after and I think the Brethren enjoyed our input to the evening.

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On the Saturday, I remained in Fife to carry out the Centenary Celebrations of Lodge Ballingry 1183. The Lodge was packed to capacity and we had an excellent day with the Fife Brethren.

It was then a flight to the Bahamas on Tuesday 14<sup>th</sup> May for the 3<sup>rd</sup> International Scottish Masonic Conference. There is a report on the conference on page 10

I arrived back in Scotland just in time to attend the AGM of the Province held in Lodge Seaforth, Fortrose before heading down the A9 once again to Barrhead to participate in a somewhat unique



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event – the dedication of a Cairn in memory of one of the Brethren of Lodge Union and Crown No 307. Apart from the weather playing up, it was a very moving and emotional day for many, and the Lodge was packed to capacity for the dedication ceremony.

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The following Tuesday, I flew down to London with Grand Secretary to attend my first tri-partite meeting of the Home Grand Lodges. It was a very productive meeting and I learned much from the experience.



On Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> June, I had the honour and privilege to Install Brother Stephen John Humphries as Provincial Grand Master of Midlothian in the Masonic Temple in Portobello.

We all enjoyed a wonderful day of celebration giving thanks for the five-year commission of Brother Thomas Constable Smith and looking forward to the new commission carrying on the good work.

On Wednesday 12<sup>th</sup> June I met and took our guests for the Communication to dinner – Brother Jean Pierre Rollet, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge Nationale de Française, his Grand Secretary and a representative from the Grand Lodge of Portugal.

On Thursday 13<sup>th</sup> June I presided over my second Grand Lodge Communication and was delighted to see a good representation from the Province of Ross and Cromarty. That evening I attended the Installation of Brother Bruce in Lodge Sir Robert Moray.

I seemed to be constantly on the A9, so I was delighted when on Saturday 15<sup>th</sup> June my journey to Dumfries was split and our Junior Grand Warden, Brother Alexander Moncrieff drove from Perth to Dumfries where I had the honour to Install Brother Robert Jess as PGM of Dumfriesshire.

The Administration Committee met on 20<sup>th</sup> June and I was pleased to attend as one of the Grand Lodge Trustees. Two days later, it was off to Glasgow to the Installation meeting of The Glasgow Star Lodge No 219 where the new Master, Brother William Hastie Gow, was going into the Chair for the second time – nothing too dramatic about that, it happens all the time – on this occasion, it was 50 years to the day from his first Installation – a remarkable achievement. That was the last engagement before heading off to the District Grand Lodge of the Far East and that report is on page 51

In between the meetings I have commissioned a couple of pilot projects which, if successful will greatly assist in securing the way forward when we eventually get the new streamlined Grand Committee up Page | 4



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and running. First, I was acutely aware that we have an administration system that emanated from Grand Lodge which we expect Lodge Secretaries to populate and keep up to date yet, no one asked Lodge Secretaries what they wanted from the system or if it was fit for purpose from their perspective. I therefore asked Brother Jimmy Young, who has much experience in change management to organise a series of workshops in Edinburgh, Aberdeen, Inverness and Glasgow with both Lodge and Provincial Grand Lodge Secretaries. Brethren, I am delighted to report that over 80 secretaries took advantage of the workshops and we have now received feed-back which we will work our way through and hopefully make necessary changes to the system which, at the end of the day, will benefit everyone involved in the process. My sincere thanks to all the Secretaries who participated and to Brother Young, who facilitated the exercise. Building on the success of this exercise, I will ask Grand Committee to give some thought as to how we can best continue to promote dialogue between Lodge and Provincial and District Secretaries at home and abroad.

Secondly, I am acutely aware that in order to portray the best possible image of Scottish Freemasonry, one of the areas we need to improve on is promotion, marketing and profiling. Three Brethren who have proven expertise in those fields have been asked to submit reports outlining the way forward as they perceive it to be. We have received two reports so far which Brother Tom Jessop's committee will study and report back. I am confident that we can make early progress in this area.

Thirdly, I am arranging that a presentation will be given to the PGM's conference in September and hopefully to our DGM's by video conference regarding a potential survey on age profiles across the Scottish Constitution to assess how we can best adapt our recruitment and retention strategies to take account of different age groups. This is an exciting piece of work that could greatly assist us in identifying target groups, how to convince them that Freemasonry can only make the world a better place and therefore – come and join us.

As I mentioned in the May edition, I have been in residence in Grand Lodge every Thursday which has proved to be most beneficial with a reasonably steady stream of visitors each week. I am keen to have it known that there is an open door invite to anyone who may wish to see me about any issue or if they just want to pop in and say hello. However, there will be Thursday's when I'll be elsewhere – so please phone and check first.

#### From the Provincial Almoner

Sadly, once again I have to start my report by recording the passing to the Grand Lodge Above of a number of our well loved and respected brethren.

Past Master Rory MacKenzie, Lodge Fingal, passed away in the County and Community Hospital, Invergordon after a long illness. Rory had first taken ill over five years ago and after major surgery and several chemotherapy treatments made a remarkable recovery and was virtually free of problems for three years before again being struck with ill health. This time he had more treatment but, sadly, without success. Rory will be forever remembered for his flawless delivery of ritual and the manner in which he conducted the annual installation ceremonies in his Mother Lodge. Rory had served for a five-year period as Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies. There was a large turnout of masonic brethren at his funeral service in Inverness Crematorium.

Past Master Victor Shepherd, Robertson's Lodge passed away in Raigmore Hospital, Inverness. Victor had been in poor health for several years and spent the last number of years in care. He had been a stalwart of his mother Lodge and was a Past Provincial Junior Grand Chaplain. There was also a huge turnout of masonic brethren at his funeral service at Contin Parish Church.

Brother Norman Brett and Brother Lawrence Waldie, both of Lodge Fingal also recently passed away. These brethren had not been in the best of health and did not attend the Lodge very much in recent years.

Last week Brother Dougie MacDougall, Lodge Fingal passed away last week. His funeral is due to take place on Tuesday 6<sup>th</sup> August. Prior to experiencing poor health over the last number of years Dougie had been very much a stalwart of Lodge Fingal. He had been a Past Substitute Master of the Lodge. As well as his masonic interests Dougie was a very keen member of the Royal British Legion and was a Standard Bearer of some repute. He was a keen historian and had on occasions delivered a lecture of the history of freemasonry in Dingwall.

Brother Bob Fullerton, Lodge Allan Wilson, who was also a Past Master of Lodge Old Inverness Kilwinning No. VI, recently passed away. Bob had been ill for a number of months. Bob, who had only been a member of Lodge Allan Wilson for a relatively short time was a regular attender at the Lodge and had been due to be installed as Inner Guard in June but sadly his health did not allow him to attend. Although not present myself at his funeral service I understand that there was a large attendance of masonic brethren.

All these brethren will be greatly missed in their respective Lodges and beyond. Visits have been made and cards sent to bereaved families, as appropriate, conveying the condolences of the Provincial Grand Master and brethren of the Province.

Past Master Angus, Lodge Ness, who had been in the County and Community Hospital, Invergordon, recently had a spell in Raigmore Hospital, Inverness. However, last week he was returned to the hospital in Invergordon. He will remain there until a suitable care package can be arranged which will allow him to return to his home at Saltburn, Invergordon

Past Master Bruce Ross, Lodge St. Duthus has also been in Raigmore Hospital, Inverness recently. He did have some treatment there but is currently at home awaiting further treatment.

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#### 3<sup>rd</sup> International Scottish Masonic Conference.

When we left Fortrose at 05.00 on Tuesday  $14^{\text{th}}$  May, it was three degrees. When we arrived in Nassau some 19 hours later at 19.00 Bahamas time, an extra zero could be added to the temperature – it was 30 degrees.

And what a welcome we received from the Bahamian Brethren. The District Grand Master, Brother Joe Curry and the Chairman of the Conference Committee, Brother Charles Johnson were at the airport along with a large Deputation from the District to give us the warmest of Nassau welcomes.

After a good night's sleep, and an excellent breakfast, we set off on the first duty of the day – to meet the Governor General, the Most Hon. Her Excellency Dame Marguerite Pindling. She was a most gracious lady and it was a real pleasure to meet her. Her late husband and former Prime Minister, Rt. Hon. Lynden Pindling was a Prince Hall Mason. Accompanying her was Past District Grand Master of Bahamas, Brother Idris Reid, who is her Special Assistant and Advisor.

After leaving the Governor General, we made our way to the Office of the Prime Minister where we were delighted to meet the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Finance, the Hon. K. Peter Turnquest. He is a Past Substitute District Grand Master of the Bahamas and is an Honorary Grand Librarian of the Grand Lodge of Scotland.



We returned to the hotel early afternoon and spent a very relaxing couple of hours in the extensive grounds of the hotel before having a briefing meeting with Grand Secretary, the DGM and Brother Kalpesh Shah who was to be my acting Grand D of C throughout the conference.

During the remainder of the evening we spent a very pleasant time meeting with the delegates who were attending conference.



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On Thursday 16<sup>th</sup> May, after a plentiful breakfast, we headed for the enormous conference facility in the Atlantis Hotel ready for the Official Opening of conference. The District Grand Master, Brother Joseph R Curry, the Conference Chairman, Past DGM, Brother Charles Johnson, the Hon. Ellsworth Johnson MP, Minister of State for Legal Affairs in the Attorney General Office (and a member of the Irish Constitution) and I were ceremoniously paraded in to a magnificent room bedecked with the flags of all countries attending the Conference. Brother Rev Dr Godfrey Bethell led us in prayer after which young David Cox Jr, a primary school boy, accompanied by the Mystique Band, sang the National Anthem. After initial contributions from the DGM, the Chairman and the Minister of State, I had the pleasure of addressing conference before officially declaring it open.



During the opening ceremony we were well entertained by children from Gerald Cash School Drum assembly – their enthusiasm and energy was fantastic, and they produced some very entertaining music.

All 350 delegates and wives then assembled for a group photo after which the Ladies departed to enjoy their programme while I was whisked off for an interview with the local TV station. Thereafter, Conference started in earnest.

The first session chaired by Brother Tom Davidson involved Grand Secretary and I talking about Grand Lodge administrative and financial procedures and future policy direction and Brother James Jack talking about the Proxy Master system after which we indulged in a very active question and answer session.



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After an ample lunch we split up into three breakout sessions. I was with the DGM's and Past DGM's in what turned out to be an extremely lively session in which we discussed the proposed annual meeting with DGM's on the Wednesday prior to the Grand Lodge Installation, Overseas Regional Summits, Grand Lodge representatives in Foreign Jurisdictions and Honorary Grand Rank Appointments.

Meanwhile, Grand Secretary was with Group B where he was part of a panel discussing administrative and financial procedures.

Brother Tom Davidson was an observer in Group C where Lodge Management and preparation of Office-bearers was discussed. Brother Jim Jack was an observer in Group A.

The outcomes of all the discussions will be published in the post Conference wind up papers.

Thursday night was a very pleasant evening of dining and culture. It was supposed to be in the Botanic Gardens but due to the inclement weather (while it was warm, we never saw the sunshine – it was raining most of our time in the Bahamas) the function was held instead in the Commissioner's Hall at Police HQ in Nassau. The highlight of the evening was undoubtedly the Bahamas National Youth Choir – their colourful, dynamic routines were brilliant. And so, came to an end another very successful day.



Friday was a very full but rewarding day with some excellent debate and equally wonderful presentations. Brother Errol Albergo, DGM of Jamaica highlighted wonderfully the need for greater family involvement in the Craft of the 21<sup>st</sup> Century. He was followed by Brother Rabih Nassar Jarmakani, DGM of Lebanon, who gave a very inspirational presentation pushing us all to be courageous in the field of technology. One of our younger Brethren, Mitchell Thurston from the Bahamas, (who was due to graduate from university at the end of the week) opened our eyes as to how we could encourage young men into Freemasonry. He was followed by Brother Pravin Sharma from



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Trinidad and Tobago and Grenada, who further dissected the issues around young candidates and gave us food for thought not only on recruitment but also on retention.

Mike Craig, DGM of East Africa then took the stage and gave us a lot to think about in terms of maintaining standards. It was fitting that he was followed by a panel who debated the issue of Masonic Decorum, Etiquette and protocol. The panel comprised four very experienced Masons – Tee Yong Kang, DGM of the Middle East, Martin Thomas, DGM of the Far East, Frank McCully, DGM of Zambia and Brother Leslie Nichols from Sierra Leone and the Gambia.

After lunch, we welcomed another panel of Depute or Past Depute DGM's – Brothers Lindell Nurse, (Barbados), Lloyd Barnett (Jamaica), Charles Farquharson (Bahamas) and Seyi Roberts (Nigeria). They tackled the thorny issue of Money. It was concluded that while there's no easy answer, it is something that must be tackled head on.

Grand Lodge seriously needs to involve Brother Sharizad and Brother Jarmakani in our quest to take Scottish Freemasonry into the 21<sup>st</sup> century in terms of technology.

The final session was conducted by three Substitute DGM's – Anthony Bostwick (Bahamas), Emmanuel Taylor (Sierra Leone and the Gambia) and Mark Minott (Jamaica). They did a marvellous job encouraging everyone to embrace the excitement of Scottish Freemasonry and in the process, showing us how we can breathe new life into our beloved Craft.

After the closing session, the Conference Chairman, Brother Charles Johnson and the DGM Brother Joseph R Curry made their closing remarks after which I had the pleasure to do a final wrap-up, announce that the 2022 Conference will be jointly hosted by our District Grand Lodges of Zambia and Zimbabwe at Victoria Falls and formally close the Conference.

The moderators during the Conference were Brothers Idris Reid, Past DGM of the Bahamas, Brother Tom Davidson, Grand Lodge, Brother Joseph R Curry, DGM of the Bahamas, Brother Kalpesh Shah, East Africa, Arthur Chase, Past DGM of the Bahamas, Scott Bartlett, Newfoundland and Labrador, Brother Edgar Moxey, Past DGM of the Bahamas, Brother Trevor Campbell, DGM Barbados, Brother Rajin Bhagwat, DGM Trinidad and Tobago and Grenada, and Brother Brian Alberga, SW Jamaica all of whom carried out their duties in a very professional manner.

On Friday evening, the Grand Lodge representatives along with the District Grand Masters and their wives enjoyed a private dinner hosted by the DGM, Brother Joseph R Curry and his charming wife,



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Terez. The event gave the opportunity, not only to enjoy a wonderful meal in the wonderful surrounds of the Sapodilla West Bay Restaurant, but it also allowed another networking event -a very important aspect of the entire Conference.

At 08.30 on Saturday morning, along with Grand Secretary and Brother Jim Jack, Chair of the Overseas Committee, I attended a meeting of District Grand Masters of the Caribbean. This was supposed to be an hour, but it extended to almost two hours during which we discussed a diverse range of issues ranging from Discipline Procedures to Proxy Masters. After the official meeting closed, I spent time with a keen group discussing the differences between the Scottish Constitution and other Constitutions and how easy it could be in the Districts for them to become Anglified in their ritual and their procedures. It was a very worthwhile session.

After a welcome coffee, it was into Regalia to attend the Regular Communication of the District Grand Lodge of the Bahamas. Brother Kalpesh Shah, District Grand Secretary of East Africa assumed the role of Grand D of C and did a splendid job. I had the honour of leading a Deputation of some eighteen Brethren into the Communication. Again, I was afforded the honour of addressing the Communication, and was delighted to have had the opportunity to so do.

When the Communication ended, we had a photo shoot with visiting Delegates, with the Commissioned Office-bearers of the Bahamas, with the Brethren of the District, but I think history was made when we managed to get a photo of the current DGM along with his five predecessors. (see next page)

We just had time to change, grab a quick bite of lunch before heading off to the site of the new Scottish Masonic Centre where I was afforded the honour of planting a tree to mark the occasion.

Saturday night was a formal night when we all attended the Masonic Ball in the Imperial Ballroom – a magnificent setting which had been used for the Conference, transformed into a Lodge Room for the Communication and transformed again for the Masonic Ball. The music for the evening was provided by the Band of the Royal Bahamas Police Force.

However, during the night we were also greatly entertained by a "Junkanoo Band" – their music and dress complimented the "Junkanoo Art" which was on display during the Conference.



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What then did we achieve during Conference? I think my overwhelming lesson was that our Brethren in the Districts are desperately keen for better communication – they want to be kept up to date with what is happening, they want to have greater involvement in the running of the Scottish Craft, they want to see better use of technology in achieving those aims, they want to be an integral part of the focus groups or committees in future and amply demonstrated how that could be achieved through technology.



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Grand Lodge needs to sit up and take cognisance of the issues that emanated from Conference – they are equally important across the Provinces as they are across the Districts. We are living in what is a very exciting time for Scottish Freemasonry, but that excitement will die a death if we don't grab the opportunities that exist for us to move our beloved Craft into the  $21^{st}$  Century.

#### FREEMASONRY AND SOCIAL MEDIA IN THE 2020's

A man once wrote, " The times they are a-changin"; they are indeed and always will be. But it is important to remember that it's not the times that are changing, but people and their actions that make changes in the world. It's also important to realise that we can be left behind if we do not take advantage of new technologies as they come along whilst not simply embracing new for the sake of new. We must apply Masonic principles, particularly those of the Senior Deacon and its jewel, the Mallet.

The issue at hand is Masonic Membership and maintaining it at a level that will keep our Lodges open and financially viable. This means recruiting new and possibly younger members. Here then are some notes I have made over the years in less than perfect order to help see the benefit of Social Media and the pitfalls that can occur if we are not careful and establish "rules".

There are many avenues open to us such as work, family and recreation; all warm contacts, i.e. we know the people we approach, but there are also cold contacts, eligible persons whom we do not know but can be reached through Social media and the Internet in general. I highlight the fact we DO NOT KNOW these men because it if we are going to recruit good and true Brethren, then we must be selective and build in a process with achievably high standards.

There is a temptation to consider Social Media as something new, and it is, but the principles when operating Social Media are not all new. In fact, clues to good operating procedures are already embedded in Freemasonry.

So, what is Social Media and how can Freemasonry safely and effectively leverage it?

It's probably best to list websites which we can use to broadcast the Masonic Message and discuss Masonic Topics: -

1) **Facebook** - speedy and two directional. Facebook will inform you if someone "posts" a message or a topic that interests you is available for viewing.

2) **Twitter** - Concise messaging or short "tweets"

- 3) **Instagram** visual messaging
- 4) WhatsApp cheap communication / with Social media aspects
- 5) **Reddit** "traditional" discussion group

In this article we will look only at Facebook as its FREE, easy to use and currently the most popular Social Media App (application) in the "West", however it's important to realise Facebook is not the only SM network and that sometimes other ones like Twitter are more valuable due to their brevity or speed of operation. We also need to consider that our Asian Brethren use popular systems hardly used at all in the "West", e.g. WeChat (like Facebook) and Weibo (like Twitter)

#### A LITTLE HELP FROM OUR FRIENDS

When creating Social Media Content, the advantage Freemasonry has over single individuals is that we have a membership. Also, this membership whilst singularly male, is varied in outlook and skills. This makes for interesting content in the required quantity. It is important to recognise that when "posting"



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one's ideas, we 100% represent The Craft, and as such content should be wholesome and adhere to Masonic principles of "no Religion and Politics". We must also remember the purpose of our Social Media effort and focus on content that would be attractive to potential members. Note here that this presupposes that the Social Media Group or Pages are OPEN and not LOCKED to members only. In this way everyone can see the positive work Masons do, and hopefully be inspired.

What is Viral Content? This is simply leveraging the Facebook "like and share" feature. It works like this: - When a post is created you as the reader can choose to LIKE it or SHARE it with "friends". The more "friends" you have on Facebook, the more people that will see the same post you liked or shared. They in turn may also choose to LIKE and SHARE and so the number of views rise exponentially, assuming the content is interesting or fun. From this we glean the necessity of LIKING and SHARING to stimulate growth. You should also be explicit and write things like "Please like and share this post if you like it" etc. While it seems crass, it works and reminds Brethren and others to comment and post; which gives you feedback on Your content or Their interest.

#### PICTURES

If you are using pictures your images should be 500 pixels across the top to 1600 pixels along the top. The rule is that all pics will be re-scaled to 500 (approx.) along the top and only when they are clicked will the scale up to their original size.

Please do not use terrible pictures, pictures of children unless you have express permission to do so and any pictures that have "signs" in in them (or rude gestures). Similarly, if using video; no signs or forbidden words or swearing. Please be aware that Facebook (FB) is GLOBAL, so signs that are rude in one country may be perfectly acceptable in another. Also, NO "biased" religion or Political content. The picture at the top of your Fan Page (Cover Photo) should be 820 x 360 or it will be fuzzy-blurry or take a long time to load on mobile devices (phones ad tablets). NOTE that Facebook imposes a margin left and right of 90 pixels so don't put important stuff left / right in the first 90 pixels. Slow load times are crucial if you use a video! Try to avoid video "headers" at the very top of the FB page.

#### **PROFESSIONAL HELP & ADVICE**

It's important to make this FUN! It shouldn't be a chore. While Facebook is easy to use, setting up a "fan page" or "business page" (same thing) you should find expert advice or read Facebook's own help sections. The one piece of information you need is that a Fan Page can only be created if you are already a member of Facebook. To be clear you are not permitted to set up a fan page if you don't have an existing account. There are many, many videos on you tune and articles via Google. Just search for "How to Set up a fan page in Facebook." Here is the link in Facebook itself. https://www.facebook.com/pages/creation/

Next just click the button which says, "create page" and follow the links and buttons for creating a page for clubs and Community things (as opposed to "for Businesses")



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#### PERSONAL, REGIONAL OR GLOBAL.

Next you need to consider "Scope", i.e. is your page at Lodge, Provincial or Grand Lodge. You should probably start with creating a "page" (actually it's more like a whole website) for your local Lodge. Or ... if you are the Provincial Grand Secretary, you may consider a page for the Province if appropriate. Here is where the difficulties arise. You will need when considering scope, if ANYONE can comment or just members of the Group. My suggestion is that with a local Lodge, everyone can comment, even people who are NOT in the Craft. After all the purpose of this article if to reach potential new members without harassment. Provincial sites are a more complex issue. After all, you wouldn't put an EA straight into Provincial. I would suggest a closed group for this situation, where the target is MMs in Daughter Lodges.

Grand Lodge? Perhaps an informational style page. i.e. a page where only The Grand Secretary, Almoner and Master post, is all that is required.

#### **EXAMPLES OF EXISTINGS OPEN SITES**

Widows Sons have some very enjoyable pages. Just go to Facebook and search for Widows Sons and view the Masonic Sites therein. There are of course many more out with the scope of this article.

#### NEGATIVITY

People in general are good and smart. They may however have an idea of Freemasons that is somewhat negative. For example: - "They [Freemasons] are a secret society that control the world and only in it to enhance each other's wealth and status." It is our job to educate by example and openness so that what we are and do become self-evident. Note that Facebook can and will deal with extreme opinions and threatening posts, so to a certain extent we don't need to be drawn into battle with "trolls". It is my opinion that one should not engage with any negative posts, and simply continue with the good work. You can of course block people who habitually "troll".

#### COSTS

Nil? Yes, nothing but your own time and knowledge.

#### **MOVING FORWARD**

Let's ask the question: "What happens if we don't leverage the power of social media?"

The answer is that someone else will grab that audience, shape it, commanding their attention, leaving no space for Freemasonry or anything else. Large organisations are desperately looking to garner a younger audience and "influence" them for profit and control. By creating Masonic Facebook Pages, we are simply offering CHOICE and OPTIONS, we are not trying to force opinions on people; simply inform if they choose to seek out our message.

#### SOCIAL MEDIA HYGEINE

Technology is powerful, and as such must be handled with care. Be aware that when posting information about yourself you are filling up a dossier on your character and behaviour. I am not trying to put Brethren off posting anything at all, just "be aware" of what you are saying and about whom. For example, when referring to a colleague simply use their first name NOT the usual form of first and last Page | 31



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names. I know Facebook will try to be helpful by supplying both and a link to their social account, but just "backspace" and keep typing. It is also common on ALL social Media Sites to post images. Just remember with a modern phone, the image will be very, very detailed, enough for someone to easily read that a "new" driver license or bus pass you just got. Surroundings too can provide nosey people with all your customer details or job contacts (remember that whiteboard in the background!)

#### **SPECIAL OFFICE BEARER?**

Implementing Social Media on just Facebook, Twitter and Instagram can be (initially) a lot of work, which may or may not be too much of a burden for the Lodge Secretary. Should a new post be created? Ask your secretary. If your secretary is of a certain age and not familiar with Blogs and Vlogging, it's probably too much work. Maybe a slightly younger Brother would be more suited to the task under the guidance of the aforementioned "old dog".

#### **MOTIVATION & JOINING**

99% of "candidates", join with little or the wrong knowledge of what Freemasonry is and how it directly benefits them as a human being. Freemasonry offers a decent way of living without the need for one specific religion, money or status. Most of all it isn't a Secret Organisation created to retain power or give unfair advantages to its members; quite the opposite. With that in mind, by creating a wee Facebook page for your Lodge you can gradually tell people what Masonic activities the Lodge are engaged in. E.g. how you gave money to local needy groups, highlighting local issues in which the Lodge assisted as a team, hold small events and "evenings" and report their successes. Like-minded people who want to be involved in such activities, will read this information on how best to help, and understand that there is a pre-existing infrastructure waiting for them in the form of Freemasonry.

Freemasonry also a relatively old and well documented organisation, so anyone interested in history and heritage will find themselves immediately at home in Freemasonry. We have a magnificent resource in the LIBRARY and ARCHIVE in the Edinburgh Grand Lodge is open to ANYONE by appointment; male, female, Christian, Islamic, atheist, mason and non-mason. This is something that generally comes as a surprise to those not in The Craft.

Fellowship is an underestimated feature of Freemasonry. There are few organisations where across the globe, you can walk into a meeting and be immediately accepted as a brother and equal. AND FINALLY

In conclusion I would leave you, dear reader of long essays, a quote from my daughter, echoing one of the more mature top Social Media "stars" Casey Neistat... "Dad, no one watches TV or reads newspapers anymore. I watch Netflix and YouTube. I confer with friends on Facebook and Snapchat, I get my news from Reddit, and would prefer you don't call me on the "telephone app" unless in emergency. Times certainly are - a - changin'.

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#### **BITS AND PIECES**

### Charity

One of the virtues promoted by the Fraternity and by all the ancillary bodies of Masonry is Charity. It is considered, by some, to be the virtue by which the others are practiced. In order to explain charity, let us first define it.

Charity is understood to be the assistance of weakness, supply of wants and is extended for the desire of benefiting others and of pleasing God. Not every act of munificence should be dignified by the name of charity. If the motive for giving is the desire for esteem or the benefit in this life, it is not charity, but usury. Those who entertain the desire to increase their acquisitions and add one superfluity to another and receive nominal advantages and imaginary pleasures is not the practice of charity, but the act of self-promotion.

There are several ways in which charity can be extended. Unfortunately, the most common is the giving of alms or money to a charitable organization or someone or group which will, hopefully utilize the funds to lessen the burden of others. There are many other forms of charity on which we neglect to concentrate.

It is said that by the practice of charity man can lay up for himself treasures in heaven, where neither rust nor moth doth corrupt. Charity is also the alleviation of the sorrows of age, the pain of sickness and the agonies of death. This charity can only be performed by the giving of time, time to comfort the aged, time to relieve the pain of sickness, time to commensurate with the grieving widow and children.

The chief reason to practice charity is the shortness and uncertainty of life for we know not when the winds of fortune will cause a sudden rotation of affairs and the downfall of the affluent and it may be hoped that no man can avoid applying those conditions and experiences to himself.

Keeping in mind that the great advantage received from the practice of charity is the promotion of the virtue among those who may be blessed with abundance of either time and/or money while those things are in abundance. For we know not when fortune may shine on another.

The great rule of charity, by which we are directed to do to others whatever we would that they should do to us, may be extended to God himself: whatever we ask of God, we ought to be ready to bestow on our neighbour; if we pray to be forgiven, we must forgive those who have trespassed against us, and is it not reasonable that when we implore from God our daily bread, that we share our bread with the hungry?

Poverty produces ignorance; and ignorance facilitates temptation. How should man avoid the path of vice who was never directed to the way of virtue?

For this reason, charity that enlightens ignorance and relieves poverty and implants virtue is the charity by which those who would probably, without assistance be the burden of the community, can be more fruitful and glorify God by reasonable service.


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By the giving of charity we may lay up some treasures of happiness against that day which will come, make no mistake, the day of age, of sickness and of death, in which they shall be able to reflect with pleasure on part of their time passed in the giving of charity.

In closing let us remember that charity is an act of piety which can be practiced with such slight and transient attention as duty may allow. Remember now, more emphatically, the night comes in which no man can work; and therefore, do not say to him, "Go away now, and tomorrow I will give." Tomorrow? Tomorrow is uncertain, almost hopeless; today, to hear the voice of charity, make haste to do, because the last moment may be upon you.

They who have given food to the hungry, clothe to the naked and instruction to the ignorant, shall be numbered among the blessed of the Father.

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#### FROM THE PROVINCIAL GRAND TREASURER

When I asked for a good response for contributions for this the 100<sup>th</sup> edition, I didn't expect to receive all that I have been delighted to receive. The following has been submitted by our Provincial Grand Treasurer, Brother Roger Cundiff whose wife's grandfather was Master of The Union Lodge No 127 (EC) in 1943. The Lodge is situated in the south east of England, in Margate, which is about as far away from our Province as is possible in the UK. It is interesting therefore to note the costs 227 years ago and to note some of the descriptions. Five Guineas for a Perfect Ashlar in 1794 – alteration in flannel draws 1/- (not sure if that should be drawers!) – but the St John's Day expenses in 1825 take a bit of beating.

Apart from the above type of expenditure there were, of course, items which occurred regularly, such as, the House Bill for refreshment consumed at each meeting, payments to Grand Lodge for annual dues, registration of members and certificates, and the expenses of the Secretary and Tyler.

The income of the Lodge was derived from members' Quarterage dues (annual subscriptions paid quarterly), Making fees (initiation), and, at one period, fees paid by brethren for the privilege of visiting the Lodge. During the years from which the above extracts are taken there were frequent occasions when the Lodge was indebted to the Treasurer in so far as its funds were concerned, but, happily, this sad state of affairs did not long prevail.

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This new booklet from the Grand Lodge of Scotland will be helpful to all but especially to those making their way up through the offices towards the chair of their Lodge. The new publication is available from Grand Lodge and priced at a very reasonable  $\pm 3.00$  per copy,  $\pm 1.00$  of which is going to Masonic Charities. The booklet is the work of the Information and Communications Committee and is a very easy guide to Masonic Etiquette and Best Practice.

It covers the A to Z of decorum within the Lodges from the correct positioning of the Altar to correct forms of Address, to Visiting. The booklet also contains guidelines for the use of Masonic Websites, Email and Social Media. One copy is currently being sent to each Master, free of charge and thereafter, the booklet will be available to all to purchase.

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#### Far East Tour - 2019

Thursday 27<sup>th</sup> June proved to be one of the better days in June and the sun was certainly shining as we made our way to Dalcross to catch the KLM flight to Amsterdam where we were to meet up with Grand Secretary and his wife Helen on the 11-hour flight to Hong Kong.

The flights were all uneventful and we arrived in Hong Kong on time at 10.30 am on Friday 28<sup>th</sup> June to be met by the District Grand Master, Brother Martin H Thomas who was accompanied by Brothers Christopher Wong and Raymond Teng.

We were taken direct to the Park Lane Hotel where we had a couple of hours to get ourselves organised before Brother Teng collected us to go to Zetland Hall for a rehearsal. The rehearsal was fine, and we left Zetland Hall and headed to the Royal Hong Kong Yacht Club where we were joined by the ladies for a cocktail party followed by an informal dinner. It was a delightful evening in the company of many of the Hong Kong Brethren and their wives.

Saturday morning and the temperature was in the high thirties, but it was cloudy and showery when we left the hotel at 11.00 am to return to Zetland Hall.

We had another rehearsal before adjourning for a very welcome coffee and the opportunity to meet the Brethren who were arriving from Hong Kong, Korea, Malaysia, Japan and beyond representing, in the main, the Scottish, English and Irish Constitutions.

Brother Christopher Wong, District Grand Director of Ceremonies, well known to many Brethren in Scotland, had all arrangements well in hand for the Consecration Ceremony. He ensured that all was in place, and that everyone was aware of what they had to do.

The spacious, well-appointed Lodge Room in Zetland Hall was full for the ceremony which was most gratifying.



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At the conclusion of the Consecration Ceremony, we adjourned for a coffee break before returning to the Lodge for the first Installation Ceremony of Lodge Trident which was carried out in exemplary fashion by the DGM, Brother Martin H Thomas. He and his team Installed Brother George Wing Chung Li into the Chair of the Lodge along with his experienced team of Office-bearers.

The entire afternoon appeared to be well appreciated by the many Brethren in attendance and their enthusiasm spilled over into the Consecration and Installation Banquet. We had a splendid meal followed by excellent speeches and a great opportunity to meet with the Brethren in attendance.

At the conclusion of the dinner, Grand Secretary and I were presented with very ornate sealing stamps in the fashion of our names translated into Cantonese. My name is pronounced as Mak Ka Hei in Cantonese and is illustrated by two Chinese characters which, when translated, mean "A beautiful dawn". The hospitality, kindness and friendliness of the Hong Kong Brethren was exceptional and likewise their ladies looked after Ann and Helen during the day and evening with great care and kindness.

Sunday dawned bright and very hot and humid. After breakfast, Ann and I went for a walk in Victoria Park while Grand Secretary and Helen went off to visit relatives in Hong Kong. All too soon it was time to leave. Brothers Raymond Teng and Henry Aun transported us to the airport for the next phase of our journey to Japan.

The flight to Tokyo Haneda Airport was fine albeit half an hour late but the problem that we faced when we reached Tokyo was that it was the last day of the G20 conference and security was heightened. It took over an hour to clear Immigration and then Customs. We were therefore delighted to see the Master of Lodge Star in the East No 640, Brother Lubor Jelinek and two of his Office-bearers, Brother Shin Nagatomo and Brother J-C Mayes all waiting to transport us from the Airport to the "Hotel New Grand" in Yokohama.

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After a good night's sleep, we were ready to get started in the morning. We were taken to the Grand Lodge of Japan Masonic Centre where I was absolutely delighted to meet up with Past Grand Master of Japan, Brother Shinya Takeda. I first met Brother Takeda in Victoria, Australia a year and a half ago and found him to be a true gentleman and a first-class Freemason. He very graciously gave us a personal guided tour of their Grand Lodge building and offices. Very impressive indeed. We spent the entire morning in the centre before heading to a nearby restaurant for a traditional Japanese lunch which I can only describe as wonderful.

The ladies then went off on a sightseeing and shopping tour while Grand secretary and I headed back to the hotel to get changed for the meeting of Lodge Star in the East No 640.

We were very pleasantly surprised when we arrived at the Lodge-room. It is small but very well appointed as are the other facilities within the building.

I find it difficult to describe the warmth of the welcome we received in the Lodge. From what I was told, the last GMM to visit was Brother Brigadier Sir Gregor MacGregor of MacGregor so we are talking 1988 -93 – some 30 years ago. We were well and truly received by Brother Lubor Jelinek, his Office-bearers and Brethren and we were able to witness a first-class working of the FC Degree. The candidate, Brother Ken Sato will, I'm sure, remember his FC Degree for a long time to come. He was also first-class answering his test questions with clarity and confidence – he was a credit to his proposer and seconder. A truly memorable night all round.

At the close of the meeting it was back to the hotel for a magnificent buffet followed by the usual obligatory speeches which were all proposed and responded to in an admirable fashion.



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Tuesday 2<sup>nd</sup> July and we were off first thing on the Shinkansen (the bullet train) to Kobe. Scotrail could learn a lot about time keeping and efficiency from the operators of Shinkansen!

The train was exactly on time on arrival at Kobe where we were met by the Master of Lodge Hiogo and Osako No 498, Brother Walter Raymond Palmer Ill. He escorted our party to the nearby hotel where we had time to get ourselves organised before heading to the Lodge in the grounds of the Kobe Club.



There, we witnessed an excellent rendition of the MM Degree – carried out with great dignity – during which Brother Riaz Hirahara was raised to the Master Mason Degree. Brother Hirahara is a young enthusiastic Mason. In business, he is the seventh generation to be running his family business dealing in eels. After the meeting we were joined by the ladies in the Kobe Club where we enjoyed excellent hospitality.



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Our two days in Japan were almost over – but what a two-days – we experienced nothing other than kindness and generosity from the Brethren of our two Lodges, both of which are proudly flying the flag of Scottish Freemasonry and doing so to the highest standard. It was a privilege and pleasure to meet with our Japanese Brethren.

At 05.30 on Wednesday morning we were driven to Kobe airport from where we flew back to Tokyo and then Tokyo to Ninoy Aquino Airport in Manilla in the Philippines. We arrived in Manilla just after lunch time and were met by old friend Brother Cameron Sloan, Brother Edwin Pineda, Master of our Lodge in the Philippines – Lodge Perla del Orient No 1034 – and Brother BK Tan and Brother Alfie Tan. We were driven into Manila and after time to get unpacked and changed we met with the Brethren for an informal dinner.

On Thursday 4<sup>th</sup> July, we assembled at 09.15, resplendent in our Barong Tagalogs to be transported to the Rizal Monument in Manila where I was to have the honour of laying a wreath in memory of Brother Dr Jose Rizal who was shot by firing squad on 30<sup>th</sup> December 1896. He was a Filipino nationalist and polymath during the tail end of the Spanish colonial period of the Philippines. An ophthalmologist by profession, Rizal became a writer and a key member of the Filipino Propaganda Movement which advocated political reforms for the colony under Spain.

He was executed by the Spanish colonial government for the crime of rebellion after the Philippine Revolution, inspired in part by his writings, broke out. Though he was not actively involved in its planning or conduct, he ultimately approved of its goals which eventually led to Philippine independence. He is widely considered one of the greatest heroes of the Philippines, especially by Freemasons.







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It was a beautiful hot morning, temperatures in the 30's when we met up with the military commander for a briefing about the wreath laying. We were feeling the heat, but it must have been much worse for the one hundred plus Marines who were on parade along with the Philippine Navy Band.





The Ceremony was carried out with great military precision and in a most dignified manner. Many bystanders stopped to watch and many more stopped with a start when the twenty-one-gun salute was fired. We were indebted to Major General Andres Centino for his assistance in organising the military contingents.

At the conclusion of the ceremony I had the opportunity to thank the Marine Guard of Honour personally for their participation. There is a constant military presence at the Memorial.



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After leaving the Memorial, we walked round Paco Park where we viewed the Rizal Tomb, the exact place where Dr Jose Rizal was secretly buried after his execution. The remains of Rizal, after exhumation on August 17, 1898, were kept in the Rizal family house in Binondo until they were brought to their final resting place in Luneta. On December 30, 1912, a solemn ceremony was held to finally bury the remains in the base of the monument dedicated in memory of Rizal.

While in the Paco Park we also saw the Gomburza Tomb, the burial site of three Filipino martyr priests, namely Fathers Mariano Gomez, Jose Burgos and Jacinto Zamora, collectively known as the Gomburza who were executed by garrotte on 17<sup>th</sup> February 1872 on charges of subversion. Their execution had a profound effect on Rizal.

The morning events finished with a visit to the magnificent Roman Catholic Manila Cathedral.

In the afternoon, we paid a courtesy visit to the Grand Lodge of the Philippines where we were greeted by the Depute Grand Master Brother Rolen Paulino. We spent a very enjoyable hour or so in their company before heading back to the hotel to get changed for the formal Banquet organised by the Brethren of Lodge Perla del Oriente No 1034 in honour of the Grand Lodge Deputation.

The Banquet was held in the beautiful surrounds of the Illustrado Restaurant. We were joined by Brother Rolen Paulino and enjoyed a splendid meal followed by well-presented Toasts and Responses.

Some readers may remember Typhoon Haiyan, the strongest recorded tropical storm which devasted the Visayas Region of the Philippines. The Grand Lodge of Scotland responded immediately to the International Relief operation but were desirous of extending a more tangible and continuing assistance to the victims. Two of our Brethren in Lodge Perla del Oriente, Cameron Sloan and Benito Tan were charged to find a suitable project that the Grand Lodge of Scotland could assist with. The result was a joint operation with the Tzu Chi Buddhist Charity Foundation to build a multi-purpose building in Ormoc that would house clinics, welfare facilities, community facilities and a Police Station. The project has been an outstanding success and is now fully operational.

That being the case, the Deputation travelled to the Tzu Chi Great Love Campus in Manila on Friday 5<sup>th</sup> July to meet up with Brother Alfredo T Li whom I met at the Banquet the previous evening. We spent a very interesting and educational morning at the Campus which houses the Ophthalmic Unit where they provide free eye treatment to those who cannot afford it. They have state of the art clinics and operating theatres where specialist Doctors and staff give of their time freely to assist those requiring treatment. At the end of the tour, we were treated to a beautiful vegetarian lunch.

Given the success of our joint venture with Tzu Chi Foundation, I am sure that we can work with them again in the future.

During the afternoon we spent a very interesting and entertaining time visiting the National Museum of the Philippines courtesy of Brother Giovanni Bautista who is a cultural properties officer with the National Museum. Our time in the Philippines concluded with an informal dinner in the evening. We were indebted to Brothers Cameron Sloan and Edwin Pineda for making all the arrangements for what I can only describe as a memorable visit to our Lodge Perla del Oriente and all the activities that were so expertly arranged for us.

Saturday  $6^{th}$  July was memorable for various reasons – the first being that we had to leave our hotel in Manila at 04.00 to travel to the airport to get an early flight to Kuala Lumpur.

On arrival in Kuala Lumpur we were met by a fine Deputation of Brethren who escorted us to the Royale Chulan Damansara where we were met by the General Manager, Brother Julian Blaydes who ensured that our stay in the hotel was memorable for all the right reasons.

We got changed and made our way to the Read Masonic Centre for the Installation of Brother Gopi Nath Nair as Master of Lodge Tullibardine in the East which was carried out to the highest standard by Past DGM, Page | 59



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Brother Dunstan Sixtus Fernandez and his Installing Team. The Grand Lodge Deputation was delightfully augmented by a few weel kent faces – Brother Scott Sneddon, Brother David Reid and Brother Mike Kinnaird – who along with Grand Secretary, Brother Dunstan S Fernandez and Brother Neoh Ho Keat completed the line-up. Over 200 Brethren were assembled for the Installation and the ensuing Installation Harmony.
