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Grand Master Masons Diary

On 7th February I chaired my first Grand Lodge Communication which was somewhat daunting but, once we got under way, things went well, and we got through the business without incident. Grand Lodge was almost full which was most encouraging.

The following evening, I attended the Provincial Grand Lodge of Midlothian where the Provincial Grand Master, Brother Thomas Constable Smith, did a first-class job installing his elected Office-bearers. It was a tremendous evening with great fellowship, hospitality and generosity.

On Saturday 9th February I travelled from Midlothian through to Lanarkshire Middle Ward where I had the privilege and pleasure of carrying out the 250th Anniversary celebrations in Lodge Cambuslang Royal Arch No 114 – an excellent day meeting many old friends from the Province and enjoying 114's tremendous hospitality.

The following Saturday involved a lengthy drive down to the Borders where I witnessed the Installation of the elected Office-bearers in our new Province of the Scottish Borders. The ceremony was carried out to the highest standard and the Harmony was well worth travelling for alone. The journey was broken in Edinburgh thanks to the good offices of Bro Garry Duff who picked Ian MacLaren and I up at Sheriffhall and drove the remainder of the way down to Lodge St Ronan's 856 in Innerleithen.

On a purely selfish note, the highlight of the Quarter was a visit to my Mother Lodge, St Barchan 156, on 19th February at which I was presented with my 50-year diploma and jewel. The evening was made more special with a Deputation from Grand Lodge, a Deputation from the Provincial Grand Lodge of Renfrewshire East and a Deputation from Lodge Seaforth being present. I must record my sincere thanks to all at Kilbarchan and to the Master of Seaforth, Graham Law who drove us all down and back.

On 22nd February I headed a Deputation to Lodge St Andrews No 25 on the occasion of it receiving University Lodge status. We witnessed a superb EA Degree for three young gentlemen, all students at St Andrews University.

My first Provincial Installation took place on Saturday 2nd March Ft William when I had the honour of Installing Brother David Crilley as Provincial Grand Master of Inverness-shire. The ceremony took place in the palatial setting of Lochaber High School, the Ceremony in the Page | 2



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assembly theatre complex and the Dinner in the spacious dining area -a wonderful day with the Lochaber weather living up to its monsoon reputation.

Later that week on 5th March, I along with the PGM of Edinburgh, visited Lodge Edinburgh Defensive Band No 151 where, as well as witnessing first-class degree work, I had the privilege of presenting a 50-year Diploma to Brother Tom Woolard PM.

The following two days were spent with the Grand Master and Grand Secretary of New York in a bid to resolve the difficulties that have existed for the past three years. Progress has been made and I'm reasonably confident that we will reach a conclusion soon.

From Edinburgh it was all the way up the A9 to Thurso where on 9^{th} March I installed Brother James Beattie as Provincial Grand Master of Caithness. What a wonderful day we all had – ceremonially all went well and thereafter we experienced good Caithness hospitality at the Dinner – a truly blessed day in the north.

From Caithness, it was the red eye flight four days later down to London to attend the Regular Communication of the United Grand Lodge of England. An excellent well-disciplined meeting followed by a delightful lunch and then a flight back to Edinburgh where, the following morning I attended the Administration Committee. That afternoon I was delighted to welcome several Brethren from 2 Scots, the Royal Regiment of Scotland before attending a Dinner hosted by ME Companion Rev Canon Joseph J Morrow, CBE, First Grand Principal of the Supreme Royal Arch Chapter. The following day I represented the Grand Lodge of Scotland at ME Companion Morrow's re-installation which was carried out by ME Companion Ian Fraser – everyone present was delighted to see Ian perform after his recent spate of ill health.

The next morning, Saturday 16th, I headed north from Edinburgh driven by Past Substitute Grand Master, Morris Wilson, up to Inverurie where I had the privilege of carrying out the rededication ceremony for Lodge Royal Ancient No 1179 on their Centenary.

The following Wednesday I attended my first meeting of the Benevolent and Care Committee and what an eye-opener that was. I was totally unaware of just how much work Mrs Dawn Oliff and her team carry out – they do a fantastic job both at home and abroad and everyone in the Scottish Craft should be eternally grateful for the expertise and professionalism that they display daily.



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Two days later, accompanied by Grand Secretary I flew to Nice and then on to Monaco to attend the Conference of European Grand Masters. It was an interesting two days during which time we saw little of Monaco, but we covered several high-profile topics during conference. These included – The Era of Conspiracy, The Captivation and The Social Media.

From Monaco it was back to Partick where on 30th March I had great pleasure indeed in carrying out the re-dedication ceremony for Partick St Mary's Lodge 117 on their 250th anniversary.

While all those events were joyful, to say the least, on 4th April I had the sad but privileged duty to present the Masonic Eulogy at the funeral of Brother Arthur Hazel. Brother Hazel was Assistant Grand Secretary and then Grand Secretary for a total of twenty-three years.

The following night I was in Larkhall to witness Reigning Masters from the Province of Lanarkshire Upper Ward work an excellent rendition of the MM Degree in the premises of Lodge St Thomas 306 in the Province of Lanarkshire Middle Ward.

On Saturday 6th April I chaired my first meeting of Provincial Grand Masters in Perth. It was a well-attended meeting with representation from all but two Provinces during which we worked our way through a very full and demanding agenda. There was some excellent debate resulting in Grand Secretary compiling a robust action plan.

On 11th April I attended the Overseas and Special Purpose Committee in Grand Lodge before heading north east to the Province of Aberdeen West where, in the Culter Village Hall, I installed Brother James Scott Anderson as the new PGM of Aberdeenshire West. A splendid day and we were joined by the Ladies at night for the Dinner and Dance.

On Saturday 27th it was back to Lanarkshire Upper Ward to install Brother John Stewart Drummond as Provincial Grand Master. Another great day down in Douglas.

Throughout the Quarter, I have been in residence in Grand Lodge every Thursday which has proved to be most beneficial with a reasonably steady stream of visitors each week. I am keen to have it known that there is an open door invite to anyone who may wish to see me about any particular issue or if they just want to pop in and say hello. However, there will be Thursday's when I'll be elsewhere – for example one Thursday in May and again a couple in July when I'll be out of the country – so please phone and check first.

BLAST FROM THE PAST - THE EDITORIAL - MAY 1999

Well doesn't time fly when you're enjoying yourself. It seems no time at all since we sat down to plan something to celebrate the Millennium - there was no great rush - it was two years away. All of a sudden it seems to be on us. It's only 28 weeks till the Celebration and Dinner and there is still a fair bit of work to do. However, things are moving along. The jewels have been a great success. To date we have sold almost 400 and there's more on order. The book is progressing. I have only two Lodges left to pin down for their potted history, the adverts are complete, the photographs have all been taken by Brother John MacKay - another few weeks and I'll be able to take the first draft to the printers. Likewise, with the Dinner - over 200 have reserved a place so far and we have still quite a few more to come. The Toast List is not yet complete but is progressing well as is the entertainment. But most of all, the whole ethos of the celebration is to raise money for local charities and isn't that going beautifully. The Jewels will make at least £2,500, the dinner will hopefully make a modest profit, the books have great potential and we hope to raise a minimum of $\pounds 3,000$ from the sale of books - then the magnificent effort from the Lodges and from Provincial Grand Lodge. So far that source has netted almost £3,500 and there's more to come. We are quietly confident that we will be able to disperse £10,000 to local charities throughout Ross-shire and the Isle of Lewis and, in so doing positively raise the profile of Freemasonry in the Highlands and Islands. I have no doubt that the entire celebration will be an outstanding success as will the publicity emanating from it. Just make sure you will be part of it. It will be the social event of the year in Ross-shire.

We arrived at the toys section and I was hoisted up to see what was on offer and there was an array of books with simple gaily coloured pictures on their fronts and a selection of pencils, paints and crayons. Amazing! Book and pencils purchased, and sweets forgotten, I was hauled back to the hoose and set up at the kitchen table, the newly acquired prizes laid out for examination. At first, I was bewildered by the lack of colour within the book but almost immediately grasped the concept of "colouring in", perhaps with more than a little explanation from good old granny. Hours passed and a pencil sharpener added to the fun.

Thus, going to Woolies with Granny for a colouring book became the weekly ritual.

Mum on discovering that a child can be silent out with sleep and feeding, bought me a painting set that came with a canvas, blank save vague outlines and numbers to inform which colours were to be placed within the borders. This was certainly a step up from colouring books and I can still remember the joy at the full picture being revealed once all the boundaries had been filled with the appropriate shades of colour. And finally - from the 1999 May edition -

I always enjoy a good crack with Bro Joe Falkner of Lodge Fingal. The last night we met, he gave me the following article which I'm sure many of you will easily relate to:

"We were born before television, before penicillin, before polio shots, frozen food, plastic, contact lens, videos, frisbees, and the pill. We were born before radar, credit cards, split atoms, laser beams and ball-point pens; before dishwashers, tumble driers, electric blankets, drip-dry clothes and, before man walked on the moon.

We got married first and then lived together. We thought fast food was what you ate in Lent. A Bic Mac was an oversized raincoat and crumpet we had for tea. We existed before house-husbands, computer dating, dual careers and when a meaningful relationship meant getting on well with your cousins. A partner was a business associate and sheltered accommodation was where you waited for a bus.

We were before day centres, group homes and disposable nappies. We never heard of FM radio, tape decks, electric typewriters, artificial hearts, word processors, yoghurt and young men wearing earrings. For us 'time-sharing' meant togetherness, a chip was a piece of wood or fried potato. Hardware meant nuts and bolts and software wasn't a word.

Before 1940 'Made in Japan' meant junk; the term 'making out' referred to how you did in your exams, stud was something that fastened a collar to a shirt and 'going all the way' meant staying on the bus to the depot. Pizzas, MacDonald's and instant coffee were unheard of. In our day cigarette smoking was fashionable; grass was mown, coke was kept in the coal house, a joint was a piece of meat you had on a Sunday and pot was something you cooked in. Rock music was a grandmother's lullaby, Eldorado was an ice-cream, and a gay person was the life and soul of the party".

We who were born before or round about 1940 must be a hardy bunch when you think of the way in which the world has changed and the adjustments we have had to make. No wonder we are so confused and there is a generation gap today - but - by the grace of God we have survived.
